Terokkar Forest introduces the herb **Terocone** (skill 250-300). This zone is a bit trickier due to its layout, but Terocone nodes are often found near the bone piles and around the Auchindoun area.

While Terocone is your main herb here, you might still find Dreaming Glory and Ragveil, which can supplement your leveling.

## Leveling from 300 to 350: Nagrand

Nagrand is the go-to zone for herbalists aiming for 350. Here, you'll find **Nagrand Arrowbloom** and **Netherbloom**.

- **Nagrand Arrowbloom** (skill 300-350)
- **Netherbloom** (skill 320-350)

Arrowbloom is widely available near the rivers and the plains, while Netherbloom grows near the mana fissures and around the Halaa area. Focusing on these two herbs will rapidly boost your skill level to 350.

## Leveling from 350 to 375: Shadowmoon Valley

The final stretch to 375 herbalism is found in Shadowmoon Valley, home to the rare and valuable **Dreaming Glory** (again) and **Netherbloom** in certain areas, but primarily:

- **Felweed** (skill 350-375)
- **Mana Thistle** (skill 350-375)
- **Flame Cap** (skill 350-375)

Shadowmoon Valley is unique because Flame Cap grows exclusively here. It is highly sought after for powerful alchemy recipes. Farming Flame Cap alongside Felweed and Mana Thistle will help you hit the level cap in herbalism efficiently.
