Use of clay requires three dimensional thinking, creativity, provides sensorial stimulus and gives satisfaction after finishing a work. There are few studies about effectiveness of this therapy. A couple of studies showed that clay art therapy provides some improvements among psychiatry patients. However very limited studies conducted with chronic neurologic disorder patients. Purpose: The aim of this study was to determine any effects of short term clay art therapy on quality of life and symptoms of depression in patients with chronic neurologic disorders .Method: Clay art therapy was performed with ten patients who hospitalised for rehabilitation for four weeks in August 2017. 5 patients had paraplegia, 3 had hemiplegia and 2 had cerebral palsy. Their mean age was 41,5 +/- 8,9 years. Therapy continued for four weeks with two sessions a week. Each session lasted three hours. Beck depression scale and 36-item short form survey (SF-36) were used to evaluate patients in week 1 and week 4. Initial and final mean values were compared with the Wilcoxon signed rank test.
