poems published pseudonymously in Reedy's Mirror in 1914. Publication as a book followed in 1915, and a second, enlarged edition came out in 1916. It consists of a series of epitaphs for residents of the cemetery in the fictional Spoon River, Illinois, both celebrating and criticizing small town life in the United States around the turn of the 20th Century. This book is in the Deseret Alphabet, a phonetic alphabet for writing English developed in the mid-19th century at the University of Deseret (now the University of Utah).
